## MD. Department of Agriculture - Hans Schmidt:

MDA is actively interviewing for vacant positions in the districts.

## MD. Department of Natural Resources - Rob Feldt:

- In the first 3.5 weeks of October, the Forest Service responded to 18 wildfires that burned 67 acres, nearly triple the 10-year average of 7 wildfires burning 21 acres for the month. The state spent 3 weeks of November under a burn ban as a result of severe drought conditions.
- Dr. Natalie Snider is joining DNR on 11/27 as the new director of the Coastal and Chesapeake Services (CCS). She has a 20-year background in integrating climate change impacts as a central consideration in strategic planning.

## <u>Farm Services Agency - Laura Pleasanton:</u>

#### CRP:

• FSA authority to administer CRP ended on September 30, 2024. Until legislation is passed that reauthorizes FSA to administer CRP, FSA is in a unique place with the program:

- No new offers can be created or processed in the software. No manual offers of any kind can be accepted. New offers are on hold and it is not known how long it will be until authority is restored.
- FSA can revise existing contracts but only if the revision does NOT result in the contract acreage increasing even a hundredth of an acre and all approvals are routed through the state office.
- To date, about 40,000 acres and about 3,500 acres are expiring on September 30, 2025 and eligible for reenrollment.
- Without current authority for CRP right now, NRCS has agreed to keep working on status reviews for next year's reenrollments (and potentially those that expire in FY26, too) and handling CPO modifications for existing contracts. They will be able to work on new enrollments to an extent. The caveat is that it is unknown what the program or person eligibility will be when the program opens again. FSA won't be able to create offers in TERRA or give estimates of acres or dollars so it's truly only possible to have very early conversations with producers and they must understand that there will be a wait.

Continued Drought: FSA is making livestock forage payments in many of the counties furthest west in the state. To date, about \$864,840 has been paid and that number continues to rise daily. Payments are based on the number and type of livestock along with the numbers of acres of pasture.

Farm Loans: The team has been training and preparing for a new rule that went into place recently that impacts both staff and borrowers.

  and our next Winter and Annual Meetings in 2025. MDA also led discussions about the
  new LEEF Program, Whole Watershed Act Request for Proposals, and issues associated
  with delayed or canceled MACS projects.
