- Area 2 Representative Amy Posey's term expiration June 2025. Amy can be reappointed for a second term. A call for nominations will go out to the Southern Area
 soon. SSCC Area Representative appoints are made by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Overview of Solar Implementation of Preserved Ag Land

Guest Speakers: David Comis w/Brandon Bowser, MD Energy Administration

Discussed solar siting beyond agricultural lands. In 2023, community solar on commercial rooftops began in MD. One of the regional storage companies is now putting solar rooftops on many locations. Rooftops are incentivized in the proposal process. Intention to incentive agrivoltaics, but how to do it is still being worked out by MEA. Open to ideas for these incentives. Community solar is only possible if there is an electrical tariff that allow it. Four companies in the region currently have those tariffs. Community solar on landfills, brown fields, or rubble fills is a new incentive. Looking to put solar on multi-family buildings. MEA interested in reaching low and moderate income farm communities that could use resiliency hub. Also have programs to put solar on public school buildings. There is also an open grant program for siting not covered under other grants. Also grants for local govt buildings. Agnostic as to where solar is sited. Do not provide incentives for on-farm solar. Under community solar program found that under residential there were several homes with 40-50 kW of energy (normal is 8kW). It turned out they were sole-proprietorship farms and used to run farms under community solar program.

Q: Are incentives driving solar development. **A:** Yes. Solar canopy and duel-use technology has worked. Use in parking lots. Too new in landfills but expect progress.

Commercial solar program is doing well. Includes small family farms. Community resiliency is also working well.

Q: Why aren't huge warehouse centers required to include solar? **A:** We tried. Proposal for rooftop greater than 85,000 sq ft be built solar-ready was proposed in the last at state level in previous administration. Was not considered.

Q: What is the typical installation height and projected lifespan? **A:** Projected lifespan is between 20-40 years. 2-3 to build. 20 years of operation. Two five-year option periods. Panel degrades incrementally over time. There is no standard on height. Geographically dependent. Here it is normally at least 18 inches. Some are 3 ft off ground. Highest is 12 ft. Most are fixed-tilt. Newer arrays follow sun. We have asked that anyone who wants to do agrivoltaics partner with university researchers. Soil impacts, runoff line, height impact (materials cost).

Q: What kind of outreach is done to companies with huge commercial buildings? **A:** Not enough. Solar companies approach after build, rather than in the plan building process. Solar developers are aggressively pursuing the larger building, but we need to do more to target the big-box companies.

Q: Can you further explain resiliency sites? **A:** Objective is to have in neighborhood that people can walk to. A resiliency hub with neighborhood support would allow for continued energy access in emergency situations. MEA has planning funds to assess what a community needs. Can be used for small farms.

Q: What happens if panels are damaged? Is there restoration money or insurance? A: It would be private insurance. Most panels are designed to resist grapefruit-sized hail.

From MEA to SSCC: What can we do to help you? Open to suggestions.

Guest Speaker: Alisha Mulkey, MDA discussed solar process that may change with new laws recently passed. Projects that come through MDA for review are mostly community solar. MDA does not approve projects, just provides feedback. MDE and DNR sign final letters of recommendations. Driver is 50% renewable energy by 2030 in MD. SSCC gets alerted when a project in proposed by memo and are followed by Environmental Review Design (ERD). Getting about two memos per week. They are coming fast. Vast majority of projects are on farmland. ERD includes of ag resources impacts- usually just the amount of farmland being taken out of production. 6-8 months later receives a request from PPRP asking for comments. Working on a process to get timely (2-6 weeks) comments back to PPRP. MDA is mapping the projects as they come in. Trying to get as much info as early as possible so that is there is a concern PPRP is aware as early as possible. Tracking the impact of solar arrays implementations on farmland loss. Review of impact on MAUF acres, conservation plans, vegetation management, etc. SCDs may not know vegetation requirements when E&S control plans come to District for review. PPRP and PSC do not have enforcement staff. How do we communicate better. MDA can notify SCD of licensing requirements- but it may be up to 5 years before developer comes to SCD. SCD relies on 2011 E&S Handbook for review it does not include native pollinator habitats often associated with solar arrays. If we are going to lose ag land, can we improve vegetation underlying the solar arrays. Bookmark this page https://webpscxb.psc.state.md.us/DMS/cpcnapplication Project info can be found here. Of 50 some plans, MDA has only one project that falls under agrivoltaics.

Q: Could ag land under solar array eventually not be considered ag land? **A:** This is a question for the MD Assessment Office.

Q: How far are we to the 50% by 2030 goal? *A:* [MEA] We are at about 33%. Some out of state. But solar must come from in-state.

NRCS Fund Distributions

Guest Speaker: Suzy Daubert went over data to show distribution of funds historically and this year.

Q: Can you explain some of the language for workgroups? **A:** 2022 and 2023 piloted and executed local working groups for funding. 2024 and 2025 funds managed from state level. Project-driven from state-level rather than giving money to local groups to distribute as needed. Concerned that the fund distributions are less equitable when handled locally.

Q: Do project types skew funding distributions? **A:** Yes. As some projects are far more costly in dollars. State-wide distribution helps distribute number of contracts more equitably across state. It has allowed MD to efficiently get money invested in projects.

Comment: Project management can be as time consuming regardless of size of project- so that gets into the staffing time needed.

Q: What does NRCS need from the Districts to better distribute funds? **A:** Look at the data we are providing and provide us feedback.

Comment: Individual county project approvals are lost in the regional snapshots.

MEMBER REPORTS

MD Department of Agriculture - Byron Petrauskas:

- Governor Moore sent out notification to all state employees, also covered in the media, stating a \$112 million salary reduction was needed in FY26. Potential impact to resources at the SCDs is the voluntary separation option (more details to come) and hiring freeze.
- District Operations is finalizing General Fund MOUs and Trust Fund Agreements and look to distribute both this afternoon or Friday.
- Questions have been coming in regarding changes to the Cover Crop Program, Jason attended the SSCC meeting to answer any questions.

MD. Department of Natural Resources - Rob Feldt:

- DNR staff responded to 0 wildfires in the first half of June, but requests for assistance in the western US are beginning to come in, and a DNR engine and crew are out west now. More requests will begin to come as we move into July and August. DNR Forestry is closely watching the changes occurring at the federal level as a potential consideration of Federal wildfire assets (USFS and Interior) may be consolidated.
- The Mid-Atlantic Fire Academy was held at Garrett College June 9-13. A very large number of DNR staff attended as well as volunteer fire company members.
- DNR Secretary Josh Kurtz spoke at the ribbon cutting of the Forest Succession Interpretive Trail at the TNC Nassawango Preserve. A crowd of 40 braved a heatwave to be in attendance and celebrate the importance of balance on the landscape and how biodiversity, ecology, and economy come together to accomplish great things. The

crowd was made up of legislators, conservation leaders, biologists, and industry leaders.

<u>Farm Services Agency – Russ Clanton and Laura Pleasanton:</u>

Opening of CRP:

In mid-May, we were able to begin accepting offers again for CRP. The statutory acreage cap is 27 million acres and at the time, we were at 25.9 million acres nationwide. This means we are accepting offers on a first come, first served basis under batching periods. The first batching period ended June 6th and we didn't know if there would be a second one, so FSA and technical staff hustled to submit as many offers as possible. Work normally completed over a span of months was handled in less than 4 weeks and we're appreciate of all the technical support from the field offices that made it possible.

Fortunately, FSA is currently still accepting offers for reenrollments and new contracts. We don't know when this next batching period will end at this point.

We're also still waiting on the Secretary/the national office to find out which offers from the first batch have been accepted, including which General CRP offers were accepted.

For those offers that are accepted, we'll be able to utilize interim conservation plans which gives technical staff an extra few months to complete conservation plans. We anticipate the announcement of a Grasslands CRP sign up soon.

ECAP:

Emergency Commodity Assistance Program (ECAP) signup is ongoing until August 15th. This is the 10 billion provided through American Relief Act. Applications have been mailed to all producers and they can also just stop by the county office to sign if that is their preference. Most payments going out within weeks of signing. Nearly 30 million dollars have been paid out in Maryland.

LFP:

Unfortunately, drought conditions have triggered LFP in 7 counties, mainly on the western shore.

Anne Arundel, Baltimore, Carroll, Cecil, Harford, Howard, Montgomery, Prince George's are LFP eligible in 2025 with various signup dates. Give those offices a call to learn more.

ECP:

With the flooding back in the middle of May near Cumberland, there is an ongoing signup for the Emergency Conservation Program in Allegany County. Signup ends on July 2nd. At this point it looks like most applicants will be receiving cost-share for debris removal and fence replacements.

Crop Reporting:

Just a quick plug since many of you also farm, to either drop by the office or make an appointment to report crops by July 15th.

Staffing:

Between DRP 1 and DRP 2, we lost 8 staff from the county offices.

We will be able to hire 5 temps. 3 will be on the eastern shore, 2 on the western shore.

- MASCD is working with ShoreRivers to implement three wetland restoration projects in Kent County, DE as part of our NFWF Grant for "Nature Based Structural Practices in Tax Ditch Watersheds". Once completed, these projects may serve as good projects to highlight through a field day or webinar. Additional funds are available through the grant to fund other wetland restoration projects, floodplain reconnection, two stage ditches, riparian buffers and other water quality practices. Jen is working with NFWF to extend the grant through April of 2027.

Associated Employers HR will also offer a virtual course each Winter with similar content, and will work with MASCD to host 8 quarterly webinars over the next two years on other management topics.
