# **Project Synopsis:**

The project provided spay/neuter services to 400 feral cats from 14 colonies in Waldorf, La Plata, Accokeek, Bryans Roads, Pomfret, Tobacco, Bel Alton and Newburg in Charles County. Free rabies vaccines were also provided to each animal and no co-pays where required from colony caretaker. All cats where assessed for admittance into Last Chance Animal Rescue's adoption program upon trapping.



# **Project Description:**

We worked diligently with Rescue Angels Animal Rescue and volunteer community cat caretakers thoughout Charles County to TNR over 400 cats this year. Each cat was spayed/neutered in order to control the population of each colony, as well as, given a rabies vaccination and ear tipped. Ear tipping was done to more easily identify colony members while vaccines help to maintain the health of colony cats and the community. We also assessed and admited 29 formally feral cats/kittens and placed them in loving homes where they are treated as members of the family!

### **Summary of Approach:**

We approached each colony with the same mind set. We had volunteers go into the community and educate the members on the importance of caring for the community cats and controling the population. We hosted classes throughout the year for both community outreach as well as education on how to humanely trap and release the community cats.

#### **Accomplishments:**

We have spayed 213 female cats, neutered 195 males cats and rescued 29 cats and kittens from a life on streets.

#### **Lessons Learned:**





We have learned throughout this endeveor the importance of accurately logging traps and trap maintance. Throughout the year we have perfected our logging system through trial and error. We now have an active logging system that is both easy to use and to maintain.

The traps often contained angry tom cats and the damage they inflicted unpon the traps and themselves is evident. We anticpate retiring a few traps this year but, rest assured, they provided more than their moneys worth in lives saved.
