Dear Maryland Veterinarian:

Subject: Reinforcing COVID-19 Prevention Efforts

The Maryland Department of Health (MDH) is reaching out to the veterinary community to ensure continued compliance with recommended COVID-19 prevention protocols. These challenging times pose a significant threat to health and well-being. As a result, MDH encourages you to take this opportunity to reinforce COVID-19 prevention efforts, while continuing to protect both animal and human health.

All veterinary clinics are encouraged to do the following:

- Review the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) <u>Interim Infection Prevention and Control Guidance for Veterinary Clinics during the COVID-19 Response</u>. This guidance, specific to veterinarians and staff providing care to companion animals, is intended to ensure that COVID-19 prevention practices are enacted to protect human and animal health.
- Advise staff to stay home if they are sick. Employees who appear to have COVID-19 <u>symptoms</u> upon arrival at work or who become sick during the day should immediately be separated from other clinic employees, animal patients, and clients and sent home.
- Advise staff who are sick or who test positive for COVID-19 that they should <u>isolate at home</u>.
- Inform team members if they have been exposed to someone who might have COVID-19
 while maintaining confidentiality. Notify the local health department of the potential
 exposure as well.
- Advise staff who have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 that they should quarantine at home.
- Ensure that information on <a href="https://hand.ncbi.nlm.ncbi.n
- Remind team members that people may be able to spread COVID-19 even if they do not show symptoms. Consider all close interactions (within 6 feet for a total of 15 minutes or more in 24 hours) with employees, clients, and others as a potential source of exposure.
- Encourage social distancing for any small-group activities such as lunches, breaks, and meetings.
