Sanitation Reports:

- Veterinary Imaging (DBA: Radiocat)
 - o They are not a limited use hospital.
 - The Board discussed the different requirements for hospitals depending on the type of facility (full service, limited use, and mobile hospitals) licenses.
 - There may be professional judgment issues if they were not prepared for an emergency.
 - o The Board had the following inquiries for Radiocat:
 - Would like to see the consent to treat form in regards to overnight emergencies and patient monitoring.
 - Do the veterinarian's clear for discharge?

Miscellaneous:

- SCRA Application Status:
 - The Board reviewed the materials for the SCRA application process.
 - Certificates will show as SCRA-XXXX and the home state license number will be displayed with the name on the certificate.
 - Because they are not eligible if there is any discipline in another jurisdiction they can be approved and ratified through the designated authority process.

Inquiry About Exotic Animals at Emergency Hospitals - (Emergency Animal Hospital of Ellicott City, Dr. Taylor Frey)

- We are an emergency hospital and about half our doctors see exotic pets but the others do not. If an owner brings in an exotic pet and we don't have an exotics doctor on we would like to offer that pet can be dropped off and placed in oxygen if needed or given a dose of pain medication if needed while it waits for the exotic doctor to come in. However, the concern is that if something happens to that pet that fault falls on the doctor on duty and their license would be at risk if the owner filed a complaint. If we had the owner sign paperwork that acknowledged that their pet wound not be fully medically evaluated until an exotic doctor came in and there is a risk the patient could pass away while they waited would that release the doctor on duty of any liability?
 - Would not rid of any liability.
 - If examined and given pain medication, a VCPR has been established and there
 would be some liability. Would need to monitor and address any changes to
 condition.
 - Should offer referrals for the owner to attempt to have the patient seen quicker.
 - Advertising, client communication and documentation would be important.
 - Board would consider all aspects of the case.

• Inquiry from Dr. Walcoff about COMAR 15.14.01.10-1 requirement for written estimate of charges signed by client for "hospitalization." (Cindy)

- Dr. Walcoff asked some questions about the Board's interpretation of what it means to be "hospitalized" which raised some questions for me. COMAR d15.14.10.03B(7) defines hospitalization.
 - Is a patient considered "hospitalized" if the client remains on site while the patient is taken back for radiographs, or other testing? How do you interpret "confinement" for purposes of triggering the need to provide a written estimate of charges? What about drop off appointments?
 - Not always a hospitalization.
 - When owner leaves it is hospitalization, may be a no-charge hospitalization. You've accepted care of the patient and should provide an estimate.

• Inquiry from Chris Smith

- o If a vet hospital has periods of time where there is only one unlicensed individual (vet assistant), is in the building overnight, is it legal to have them administer a continuous infusion rate of fentanyl via syringe pump? The fentanyl has been dispensed by a registered veterinary technician, however is left in the pump for the vet assistant to maintain.
 - They would not be able to do this because this would give access to a controlled substance.

May consider the use of a patch instead.

• Inquiry Regarding Prescriptions for Patients examined at the same hospital - Dr. Michelle Silver

- o Dr. Silver submitted an inquiry to determine if she could offer prescriptions while consulting with Veterinarians performing examinations at the hospital that she works at.
 - In the event of an emergency the examining veterinarian would be coordinating the emergency care. This is more of a consultation situation with colleagues in a hospital.
 - This would be ok and she is providing ongoing communication with the owners to manage care as a specialist.

• Information regarding Veterinarians discussing Federally controlled substances with clients.

- We've been made aware that a legislator has reached out to the department because they are considering legislation to mirror a few other states that have allowed conversations about Cannabis/Hemp products with clients.
- o The Agency would not have a position for this bill at this time.

• VIN - Drip Vet - Legal requirements of medical records.

Cindy informed the Board that the Drip Vet course that is commonly used to meet
 Continuing Education requirements in Consent Agreements for cases that involve record
 keeping has been merged with another course and is now called "Efficient medical record
 keeping for veterinarians."

In a motion by Ms. Quimby, and seconded by Dr. Calvert, the Team voted unanimously to adjourn the meeting to move into an administrative closed session to perform administrative functions outside the scope of the Open Meetings Act, in accordance with § 3-103(a)(1)(i) of the General Provisions Article.
